REGISTRATION: HOW TO DEAL WITH... ENROLLMENT

All incoming students have to enroll at the *Studierendensekretariat* office which is located in Forum 1 (the entrance is just across the "Alte Mensa").

You should receive the list of required documents via mail. Be sure to complete the enrollment process before the stated deadline.

MODULE/EXAM REGISTRATION

Module registration will be explained during the MIEPP introduction meeting. You can also find a detailed guide <u>here</u>.

All module registration is completed online via <u>Jogustine</u>, the student portal. After your enrollment, in case you do not receive the Jogustine login code via email, you may obtain it at the main library (*Zentralbibliothek*).

All registration must be completed by the end of the registration period. Otherwise, you will not be able to register for exams. With most classes, you will need to register for first the module, then the lecture as well as the tutorial. There is enough time to register for classes in that week. There are sufficient seat allocation in each class for as many students. **Do not panic.**

You will register for exams separately during the semester. This registration period will be announced via e-mail to your student email account. Note that you cannot take an exam and receive credit if you do not register. <u>Here is a great guide for exam registration.</u>



RESIDENCE REGISTRATION & PERMIT FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Within 14-days of moving into your residence in Mainz, you will need to register ("*Anmeldung*") your new accommodation in the city of Mainz. You need to make an appointment for this on the following website: (<u>Online-Terminvereinbarung bei der Stadtverwaltung Mainz</u> <u>| Terminvereinbarung online</u>).

In order to get your *Anmeldung*, your landlord (whomever you are renting from) has to provide you with a confirmation of address form ("*Wohnungsüberbestätigung*"). You will present this form and other details to the citizen's office. You can find out more about what you will need here: (<u>Wohnsitz anmelden | Landeshauptstadt Mainz</u>).

Once you have successfully completed your city registration, you can apply for your residence permit. It is advisable to book an appointment date within 3-6 months from the expiry of your current visa permit, using the same link above.

If however your Visa/permit does expire or you are unable to get an appointment in time, you can apply for a Fiktionsbescheinigung (temporary permit) through e-mail (<u>auslaenderbehoerde@stadt.mainz.de</u>).

Make sure the mail is in German to increase chances of them responding. You do have to pay around 30 Euros extra for the document on your next appointment for the permit. The citizen's office (*Stadthaus Kaiserstrasse*) is located within walking distance of the Mainz Central Station. The office hours are provided below:

Bürgeramt/Auslanderbehörde (Office Hours) Monday 09:00 - 13:00 and 15:00 - 19:00, Tuesday, Wednesday 09:00 - 13:00 and 14:30 - 17:00, Thursday, Friday 07:30 - 13:00.

LIVING FUNDAMENTALS

HOUSING/ACCOMMODATION IN MAINZ

Follow Facebook pages from the various *Wohnheims* (e.g. <u>https://www.facebook.com/groups/154522171249483</u>, <u>https://www.facebook.com/groups/408519909181415</u> etc.) to keep an eye out for announcements regarding people subletting.

Joining the *Wohnheim* WhatsApp groups also helps in this regard. Also, it is useful to check in the university building blackboard, Flat shares are often announced, in this media. It is very common to find post or announcements of Flat Shares within university campus, from other students.

BANKING

Students can choose from a wide variety of banks to open their accounts. Student accounts are usually free (i.e. no annual fees, transaction fees etc.), and online banking transactions are secured with 2nd factor authentication (i.e. TAN codes). However, please note that the banks may charge fees if you withdraw from an ATM that belongs to a different bank.

Good thing to note: there are banking unions where groups of banks share their ATM networks and hence do not charge fees if withdrawals are made from ATMs within the group (e.g. Cash group banks). However, most bank accounts require you to deposit some amount of money into the account every month in order for it to be free. E.g. a *Commerzbank Girokonto* is free of charge as long as there is a deposit of 700 Euros every month, otherwise there is a monthly charge of 11 Euros. Also it is generally a good idea to **avoid** *Deutsche Bank* as the entire process for opening an account takes a few weeks and is usually done by post. After a recent change in regulations however, most banks now require a residence permit to open a new account.

Therefore, if you do not have a residence permit yet and you do not need to deposit cash on your account and can live without in-person consultation, an alternative choice might be an online bank which does not charge any fees and in addition allows for free cash withdrawals at **any(!) ATM** (some may only be applicable for EU-citizens/long-term residents). Examples of such online banks are **Wise and Revolut.** The waiting time for opening an account with them is super short (usually one day or even less, the card arrives by post in a few days though) so if you need an account in a pinch this would be the way to go.

Some commonly used banks and their respective banking groups: <u>Cash Group:</u> *Commerzbank, Deutsche Bank, Postbank & Hypovereinsbank*.

<u>Sparkassen Network:</u> *Sparkassen* in Germany (e.g. *Sparkasse Mainz*) <u>VR Group:</u> *Volksbanken & Raiffeisenbanken* in Germany (e.g. *Mainzer Volksbank eG*)

Direct (online) Banks: N26, Comdirect, DAB, DKB

*Please note that this is not a complete overview of all available banks.

Also, in case you arrived in Germany and you don't have a German bank account, and you need to make some payments (rent, university fees, international transfer of money, etc), you can try "*Reisebank*", they have a small office inside Mainz Main central station, you don't need to have a bank account to make payments through them. The only thing is that there is a fee of approx. 6 euros per transaction.





HEALTH INSURANCE

As you probably know, having a health insurance is **mandatory** in Germany. If you do not hold a valid health insurance policy, the university may withdraw your place!

EU students may be covered by their domestic insurance provider. Just ask your provider for the **European Health Insurance Card (EHIC)**. If you come from a non-EU country, there are many providers you can choose from, both public and private. Private health insurance policies tend to be cheaper but may not have the same coverage as the public ones, so choose one according to your needs. Students who are older than 30 years may face some restrictions. Some commonly used insurance companies:

<u>Public</u>: *AOK, DAK, HKK, TK* (approx. 100-140 Eur per month for students) (Also *AOK* and *TK* have offices to sign up within University campus, next to *Zentral Mensa*)

Private: Debeka, Hanse Merkur, Mawista accepts students older than

30 years, however you will need a letter of exemption from a statutory insurance provider. You can obtain this letter from the *TK* office on campus.



MEDICAL CARE

General practitioner – Find a house-doctor as soon as possible to avoid long waiting times and unnecessary hassle at the hospital in the time of need. A house-doctor can recommend you to a specialist or provide written recommendation for medical tests and also provide you with a sick note for University or job when needed. STUDENT AID/ BAFÖG



In Germany, everyone who is a formal resident (working or studying here for a longer period) **may be eligible for financial help from the state.** If, and how much aid you receive depends on your overall financial situation and the income of your parents (important: not the wealth of your parents, only their income!).

The office will have a look at your individual case and decide whether or not you are entitled to receive aid.

All MIEPP graduates are welcomed to join the **MIEPP Alumni Network on Xing and LinkedIn**. The student representatives are working together with the program coordinator and professors to set up a useful network. As you progress in your course of study, the network may assist you with internships, career opportunities and recommendations, and eventually, once you have graduated, it may serve as a platform allowing you to keep in touch with fellow MIEPPs and support one another. Last but not least, the MIEPP Alumni Network represents the relatively young program (started in 2010) at both the academic and professional level and will help to further boost the recognition of the MIEPP program. CONFERENCES AND SUMMER/WINTER SCHOOLS

For students, there are many opportunities for learning and building personal networks outside the traditional classroom - with conferences being a major one. In Europe and UK, many top universities and organisations conduct regular conferences which may be of interest to students. Additionally, there are also numerous summer and winter school courses offered by other universities which may be of interest to you. **Here we share some of those we know:**



1 Campus for Finance - organised by WHU

WHU is considered one of Germany's best private business schools. If you would like to hear from top consulting firms, the big four accounting firms or major financial institutions, do check out their annual events in January and March. *Hint: Suit and tie event, business formal, name cards (good to have) <u>http://campus-for-finance.com/</u>

2 - FORTHEM

FORTHEM is a network of nine multidisciplinary public research universities with a strong regional anchoring in Finland, France, Germany, Italy, Latvia, Norway, Poland, Romania and Spain. Short-term mobility opportunities are available for students and staff of all nine universities, ranging from 2-5 days. These opportunities are typically funded. 3 - Others

There are many other opportunities to participate in interesting conferences and courses as a student. Most (with the exception of the Go east initiative) are self-funded while the fees are relatively affordable (from $30 \in$ to $200 \in$). Do not hesitate to invest some time in researching such opportunities or simply ask around!

DOUBLE DEGREE PROGRAMS

There are opportunities to obtain two master's degrees within the 2year program, by spending two semesters abroad either in Poland or in France. There are set requirements to complete in Mainz, i.e. 60 credits, including core modules. The application process is open towards the end of winter semester.

At the end, you receive a Master of Science in International Economics and Public Policy from Mainz as well as the degree qualification from the partner university.





INTRODUCTION DAY

Usually on the first day of the upcoming semester, faculty members present the content of their courses to the first- and second-semester MIEPP students (higher semester students are, of course, also welcome to attend). This way, the faculty will seize the opportunity to welcome all new MIEPP students (and re-welcome the more senior ones). Also, it will help students with their choice of courses. This is particularly important for students starting in the summer semester since there are no mandatory lectures during summer. Detailed information on the introduction week program will be provided by the study office before the beginning of the new semester. You will also be provided with the important dates and deadlines throughout the semester so make sure you note them down.

LEARNING MATERIALS

Our professors will usually upload their slide sets on either moodle (<u>https://moodle.uni-mainz.de/login/index.php</u>) or Microsoft Teams (details are announced by each professor during the first lecture). You will need to log in with your university account to gain access. You may use the search function to find the appropriate module, and use the password given in class to access the lecture notes and tutorial sheets.



MEETING OTHER MIEPP STUDENTS

You will get to know the other MIEPP students during orientation week, however, in case you cannot wait until your first day on campus, do not worry, your student representatives will plan some customary welcome events before the start of every semester and the dates for the said events will be shared on the semester WhatsApp group. Alternatively, you can also use the WhatsApp group to set up your own meet ups and events if you are too eager.

MENTORING BY A PROFESSOR

In the MIEPP program, each student is assigned an **academic mentor**. Usually, the professor dedicated to you as your mentor will invite you to an informal meetup, where you will chat about how your studies are going on, where you are from, etc. Besides, you may also request assistance, for instance, if you require academic support in the course of the master program or in case you need a recommendation letter.

MIEPP STUDENT INFO HUB

Very important news from the faculty and administration regarding the MIEPP program are usually disseminated on the **MIEPP Student Info Hub** through <u>Moodle</u>. Students will be automatically added to the Info Hub.

Registration for seminars will be announced via Student E-Mail, thus it is important you check your student E-Mail regularly. Pay attention to the deadlines, because after **deadlines** pass is not possible to register for seminars.



SEMESTER ABROAD/ EXCHANGE

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IT RELATED STUFF CHANGING UNIVERSITY ACCOUNT LANGUAGE TO ENGLISH

After having activated the ZDV account, some of you may be stumped by the default system language. To switch to English using Microsoft Windows 7 Operating System and MS Office software in English, just click on the Windows Start-button and enter "*Softwarecenter*" into your search box. In this program "*Verfügbare Software*" refers to the available versions of a bunch of tools and programs. Select "Windows 7 Language Pack EN-US V1000 - install - passive" & "Office 2013 Pro Plus EN ZDV V1000 - install - passive" and click on "*Auswahl installieren*" to install the language packs. You may be prompted to log-out of the system. After a short logout, just login again and enjoy using the system in the language of your choice. If you have difficulties with this, please check the Appendix for screenshots.

PRINTING FROM YOUR PERSONAL DEVICE

If you prefer using the university's printers but do not want to miss the comfort of working with your own device - this section may be helpful. Just add your preferred printers in the university wifi network to your personal device (you need to be connected to Uni Mainz WIFI in order to do so). Posters above the printer usually indicate their respective network ID.

REMOTE ACCESS TO UNIVERSITY ACCOUNT FROM A PERSONAL DEVICE

Students are able to use remote desktop applications to access their university account from a personal device (laptop - Windows/Mac, Android phones, Windows phones, iphones, tablets).

SOFTWARE

Our university has signed an agreement with Microsoft allowing all students to download, install and use **Microsoft Office 365** software on their personal computing devices for free. This is valid for both Windows and Macintosh systems: <u>https://www.zdv.uni-</u> <u>mainz.de/software/</u>

UNIVERSITY EMAIL ACCOUNT

VIRTUAL PRIVATE NETWORK (VPN)

As you may possibly be aware of, Virtual Private Networks (VPN) grant access to your favourite Youtube stars or Facebook followers even if you are in a country with restricted access to the world wide web (successfully tested in China).

STUDENT LIFE MIEPP BUDDY PROGRAM

At the beginning of every semester, a buddy program is organized by the MIEPP student representatives whereby each first semester student is assigned a MIEPP student from one of the previous semesters as a buddy. In addition, you will get the opportunity (together with your buddy) to join the faculties mentoring program "**WelcomeO3**". Throughout the semester different activities will be organized by the mentoring students, such as a visit to the Christmas market, bowling, hiking or a pub quiz evening. **Perfect way to meet other students!**
